These data describe some of the violence perpetrated by family members or caregivers in our county from 2007 to 2009 (the most recent available data). These figures cover only part of the prevalence of family violence, because many cases never come to the attention of authorities.

Reports of abuse, neglect or exploitation in long term care facilities (per 100 resident beds)	1.6	2.7	2.3

- Montgomery County had a higher rate of petitions for civil protection orders compared to similar counties in Ohio.
- Montgomery County had a lower rate of reports of abuse, neglect or exploitation in LTC facilities compared to similar counties.
- Differences over time or across counties may be due to differences in the underlying scope of family violence, differences in agencies' capacity and/or differences in agencies' reporting procedures.
