

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Each year in Ohio...

>30,000 children (0-17) are abused or neglected

>65,000 women (18-64) are physically assaulted by a current or former partner

>105,000 seniors (60+) are abused, neglected or financially exploited



Child maltreatment: >30,000

81,608 reports are filed with children's services

14,711 reports of neglect are substantiated/indicated

11,764 reports of physical abuse “

5,246 reports of sexual abuse “

2,160 reports of emotional abuse “

4,341 take shelter with DV shelter

Physical IPV: >65,000 (women 18-64)

46,654 victims in DV incidents involving police

19,081 petitions for DV civil protection orders

4,761 take shelter in a DV shelter



Elder abuse: >105,000 (seniors 60+)

8,010 reports to adult protective services






cases per year among 0-17 year olds

Comparing teen dating violence to other threats to teenage females' health in Ohio




cases per year among females 15-19 year olds

>7,870 seniors (60+) are abused, neglected or financially exploited

7,213 victims in DV incidents involving police

2,085 petitions for DV civil protection orders

244 take shelter in a DV shelter




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
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
of Petitions for Domestic Violence Civil Protection Orders per 10,000 residents (with 95% CI) in 5 County Types in Ohio, 2010-2012




of Petitions for Domestic Violence Civil Protection Orders in 6 Major Metropolitan Counties, 2006-2012

Intimate Partner Violence in Greene County

Intimate partner violence involves physical, sexual, and/or emotional violence that occurs in the context of a current or former relationship. The most serious injuries and adverse consequences of intimate partner violence are disproportionately experienced by women. A perpetrator often abuses power in order to control his partner. To illustrate the scope and consequences of child maltreatment, we present the most accurate and recent available data. Nonetheless, they omit many cases that never come to the attention of the authorities.

Each year, for the 53,215 women (18-64) in our County:

- > 950 are physically assaulted by a current or former partner*
- 63 take shelter in a local domestic violence shelter**

And for the 7,259 females (15-19) in our County:

- > 580 experience physical dating violence*
- > 530 are forced to do sexual things by someone they are dating*

And for the 34,810 children (0-17) in our County:

- > 620 live in homes where an adult reports intimate partner violence is occurring*
- 64 take shelter in a local domestic violence shelter**

In addition, across our County:

- 643 victims are involved in domestic violence incidents recorded by law enforcement***
- 221 domestic violence civil protection orders are filed

Some quick notes about these figures:

*Rounded, conservative estimate, based on the 95% lower confidence limit of survey data.

**Figures for domestic violence shelters only include those located in Greene County. Some residents may use shelters elsewhere. "n/a" indicates there are no domestic violence shelters in this county. Figures for adults may include a small number of victims 65+.

***Includes incidents recorded through the Ohio Incident Based Reporting System. "n/a" indicates there was insufficient data to compute a figure for this area.

Do not compare figures to data published previously. The methods and definitions have changed.

Each year, among the 34,810 children (0-17) in our area...

- > 620 live in homes where intimate partner violence is occurring*
- 64 take shelter in a local domestic violence shelter**

In addition, across the area...

- 221 petitions for domestic violence civil protection orders are filed
- 643 victims are involved in domestic violence incidents handled by law enforcement***



Comparing intimate partner violence to other threats to women's health in Greene County





Petitions for domestic violence civil protection orders (DVCPOs)



Annual rate of DVCPO's per 10,000 adults [with 95% CIs]

Some victims use DVCPOs to seek protection from an abusive partner for themselves and endangered loved ones.

For years, Ohio counties have tallied DVCPOs in a similar manner, so these data are useful to examine trends and geographic differences. The chart at left suggests that the rate of DVCPOs in Greene County has remained relatively steady over time. And the chart above suggests that the current rate is lower than the rate in other comparable areas. These findings could be due to the ability of victims to request CPOs as well as the underlying incidence of violence. For a discussion of when differences and changes are noteworthy, please refer to our methods report.
